Bull Trout Surprise

Many of you have probably seen the recent article concerning bull trout (Salvelinus confluentus) which appeared in the O-N-D 2015 issue of Fly Fisherman magazine. It reminded me of my one and only encounter with this special char. In the late 1990s, I had the opportunity to fish in Alberta with my wife, Joan. We floated the Bow River and caught many, some truly large, rainbows. I decided to hit the back-country but my wife decided that since it was the rut for elk and lowland berry time for grizzlies that she'd spend time sightseeing instead of looking over her shoulder all day long!

I hired a guide and we set off in his pickup truck for a 2+ hrs drive on dirt roads to who-knows-where. We ended up at a stream called the Oldman River, near the British Columbia border. I asked the guide if he was armed as there were numerous closed hiking trails in the region due to bear activity. He said "yes' and pointed to the hip holster of bear spray. I was hoping for a Gatling gun but he said that the spray was better protection than a 44-agnum (since confirmed by some other guides). Reason being, if you don't hit the bear with a kill shot, you only piss it off and then you're in real trouble. I must admit to a day of constant worry.

Anyway, we caught many cutthroats on dries all day long. However, the most memorable part of the trip came when I was fishing a deep pool just downstream from a cascade. I had about a 12-in cutt on when suddenly there were two previously unseen submarines that came charging out of the depths. The submarines were in fact bull trout. They were trying to grab the cutthroat for lunch. Both missed. As soon as I landed the fish, the guide changed rods to a sinktip with a 6-in striper-type (!) fly. He had obviously not been surprised by the appearance of bull trout and came prepared to pursue them if they made their presence known. Needless to say that was the first and last we saw of those two bull trout. However, the momentary shock that their attack gave me was the most memorable part of that long trip to the backcountry and one I'll always remember.
