Al Brewster Award

Al Brewster was a founding member of the Cape Cod TU chapter. Born and raised in East Providence RI he grew up fishing, hunting and enjoying the outdoors in every way possible. At an early age he was introduced to fly-tying when famous fly tier Rube Cross began attending the meetings at Al's local sporting club, the South Seekonk Rod & Gun Club. This led to long term friendship and collaboration with many members of the Catskill tying community -- Art Flick and Al shared many hours together at the bench and on the water. Al and Harold Gibbs began the Rhody Fly Rodders in 1963. It was the nation's first saltwater fly fishing organization and remains a leader in promotion of the sport. In addition to his skills as a fly tier and a fly fisherman Al developed into an extraordinary bird carver. When he retired to Cape Cod the closest fly-fishing club was the Southeast Chapter of TU. After a number of years travelling to meetings off-Cape, AI, Mike Arritt and others from that chapter who lived on Cape decided it was time for a flyfishing organization to be based on Cape. Thus began the Cape Cod TU chapter. For the rest of his life Al remained an active member and avid supporter of the Chapter, participating in the Chapter's activities and being a major donor for its fundraising activities. He gave duck decoys every year to the Chapter, which were among the most financially rewarding gifts received by the organization. He was always more than generous with his time – willing to answer a question or provide guidance on any topic related to flyfishing. He took an especially keen interest in introducing women and youth to the sport. It is in recognition of these contributions to the Chapter the Al Brewster award was developed to honor individuals who support the Chapter in the manner exemplified by Al.

Atlantic Salmon Fishing DIY: How the King's Men Can Chase the Fish of Kings

Ever wanted to chase Atlantic salmon but felt like it was too expensive, too remote, and too unfamiliar? In this presentation by Ben Carmichael, we'll cover how you can chase Atlantic salmon for less with the rods you already own. Ben is a writer, photographer, and videographer focused on fly fishing. He is the editor of New England on the Fly, a website about fly fishing across New England. Ben has contributed articles to The Drake, The Atlantic Salmon Journal, The Boston Globe, On The Water, Eastern Fly Fishing, and On Earth, among others, and worked for both The New Yorker and New York magazine. He has edited a few books about Atlantic salmon fishing, and is on the U.S. Board of the Miramichi Salmon Association, and is a former member of the American Museum of Fly Fishing Angler's Circle. Total pickups of all species at 4 or 5 sites on the Childs River on May 9 and May 10 as a preconstruction baseline survey followed by the regular Childs River PIT tagging run on May 15.

Red Brook is May 16 and May 17

Coonamessett River on May 20

Quashnet River on May 21, 22 and May 23

Santuit River on May 28.

Directions:

From Cape Cod Canal take Rte. 6 to Exit 9A, go South on Rte. 134, turn left onto Upper County road and after crossing over the Swan River take the second left, Indian Road/Indian Trail Lane (it is called both names), turn left and follow to house #67, turn right onto a dirt road at the Town Landing.

Start

At launch at boat ramp in river,7AM to 11AM

Length: 1-2 miles in river.

Tidal: Yes, strong currents at times.

Parking: Yes, Dirt Parking Lot


Notes:

Strong currents possible. Safety First, bring PFD for each person, cover whole body for ticks if near weeded areas taking kayak on the shore, for example. Bring water, sun screen, sun glasses, whistle and compass, bring plastic garbage bags and fishing equipment, as we can fish if there is not much garbage to clean up.

Each kayak must have a throw-able rope and an extra paddle.
